
State Bar of New Mexico 2011 Membership Survey June 2011

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I. INTRODUCTION



Methodology

This research study was commissioned by the State Bar of New Mexico to assess members' attitudes and opinions pertaining to various Bar related issues including communications, Bar involvement in the judiciary, reciprocity, malpractice insurance, paralegal issues, the Disciplinary Board, Pro Hac Vic Rule, Casemaker, and CLE among others.

The Interview

The survey was conducted online and by mail. All State Bar members who have an email address were sent an email invitation from the State Bar of New Mexico inviting them to participate in the study. The email invitation included a link to an external website where the survey was hosted and each member was given a unique password allowing them to stop and start the survey at their leisure. Two reminder emails were also sent to encourage participation in the study.

Members who do not have an email address on record were sent a survey through the mail. Reminders were sent through the *Bar Bulletin* encouraging participation.

The initial email and mail surveys were sent out the week of March 23rd. Members were given until April 15th to complete and return their survey.

Response Rate

A total of 6,693 survey invitations were sent out either by mail or email. In total, 1,307 surveys were completed and returned which translates to a response rate of 20%.

Executive Summary Key Findings

Communications:

- Seven-in-ten State Bar members say they would prefer to be contacted by the State Bar of New Mexico through detailed emails, while 37% prefer traditional mailings and 32% say they would prefer emails with a link to the website for details.
- The *Bar Bulletin* is a widely read and valuable resource to members. The vast majority of State Bar members (95%) say they receive information about State Bar of New Mexico programs, services, and activities through the *Bar Bulletin*, while 66% say they receive information through email, 30% indicate that they go to the State Bar website, and 26% report receiving information through CLE providers.
- Nearly half (47%) of the State Bar members who responded to the survey say they always read the Bar Bulletin and 34% say they usually read it.
- Approximately two-thirds (64%) of State Bar members indicate that they would prefer to receive the *Bar Bulletin* through the mail, while 36% would prefer an e-mail version of the publication.
- The majority of members (54%) prefer paying their annual dues by mail, while 44% prefer paying their dues online.

CLE

- When asked what format they prefer for CLE seminars, the vast majority of members (83%) choose live seminars, while 30% prefer online videos (self-study), 20% say they prefer live webcasts, and 18% mention video replay.
- The slight majority of members (53%) say they typically learn about seminars offered by the State Bar's CLE department through the Calendar of Events in the Bar Bulletin, while 45% say they learn about the seminars through the CLE-At-A-Glance.

Casemaker:

- Over two-fifths (43%) of the State Bar members say they have used Casemaker for their legal research. The vast majority (83%) of attorneys who use Casemaker say they are pleased with the research offerings available through the service.

Volunteerism

- Just over half (53%) of the State Bar members surveyed say they are currently a member of a voluntary bar association. In total, 28% say they are active members of a voluntary bar.

State Bar Involvement in the Judiciary:

- The vast majority of members who responded to the survey appear to believe the State Bar of New Mexico should take an active role in judiciary matters.
- 85% believe the State Bar should be actively supporting independence of the judiciary.
- 82% believe the State Bar should be actively educating the public on the judiciary.
- 76% believe the State Bar should take an active role in eliminating partisanship from judicial races.
- 70% believe the State Bar should be monitoring and responding to criticism of judges and 69% feel the State Bar should monitor/respond to judicial campaign activity.
- Although the majority (54%) of members believe the State Bar should take an active role in support of increasing compensation for judges, 46% disagree.

Reciprocity

- Over three-quarters (77%) of members say they support reciprocal licensing for New Mexico lawyers with other states.
- Furthermore, 76% say they support the Board of Bar Commissioners advocating a Supreme Court rule change in favor of reciprocity.

Pro Hac Vice Rule

- The vast majority (89%) of members say they support the Pro Hac Vice Rule. However, they are divided in that 53% say they support an increase in the \$250 fee paid by the non-admitted attorneys to benefit civil legal service programs, while 47% are opposed to increasing this fee.
- Members are also divided on limiting pro hac vice appearances by out-of-state attorneys as 49% say they are supportive of such limits and 51% are opposed to limiting appearances by out-of-state attorneys.


Disciplinary Board

- The large majority (61%) of State Bar members **do not** believe that the sanctions imposed by trial judges for lawyer misconduct are sufficient to address violations of the Rules of Professional Conduct, though 39% do believe they are sufficient.
- When asked what CLE courses relating to Rules of Professional Conduct they would be interested in taking, the majority (57%) of respondents express taking a course in conflicts, while 44% would like to take a course in the disciplinary process, 36% express interest in fee arrangements, and 20% are interested in in trust accounts.

Malpractice Insurance

- Nearly three-fifths (59%) of members say they favor the Board of Bar Commissioners proposing a Supreme Court Rule that would require malpractice insurance to practice law in New Mexico.
- Approximately two-thirds (64%) of members say they currently have malpractice insurance.
- Two-thirds (68%) of those who do not have malpractice insurance say they are exempt, while 19% say they do not carry insurance because of the cost and 9% say it encourages lawsuits.
- Less than half (47%) of the members say they would favor payee notification by insurance companies to clients of settlements and just under two-fifths (39%) believe malpractice insurance information about individual attorneys should be disclosed to the public.



As shown above, 70% of State Bar members say they would prefer to be contacted by the State Bar of New Mexico through detailed emails, while 37% prefer traditional mailings, and 32% say they would prefer emails with a link to the website for details. The percentages equal more than 100% due to the fact that multiple responses were allowed.

The vast majority of State Bar members (95%) say they receive information about State Bar programs, services, and activities through the *Bar Bulletin*, while 66% say they receive information through email, 30% indicate that they go to the State Bar website, 26% report receiving information through CLE providers, 24% mention their colleagues, and 16% say they receive information through the directory. The percentages equal more than 100% due to the fact that multiple responses were allowed.



Nearly half (47%) of the State Bar members surveyed say they *always* read the *Bar Bulletin* and 34% say they *usually* read it. Eighteen percent report that they *sometimes* read the *Bar Bulletin* and just 2% say they *never* read the publication.

The plurality (33%) of those who say they *never* read the *Bar Bulletin* report being too busy to do so, while 22% say it is irrelevant to their practice and another 11% say the cases are not pertinent.



As shown above, 13% of the members say they *always* read the New Mexico Lawyer insert in the *Bar Bulletin*, while 32% say they *usually* read it and 45% say they *sometimes* read the insert. Eleven percent of the respondents say they *never* read the New Mexico Lawyer insert.

When asked why they *never* read the New Mexico Lawyer insert, 30%, of the respondents report being uninterested, while 24% say they do not have enough time/too busy, 14% say it is not relevant, and another 14% say they do not know what it is.

Underlying Reasons for NEVER Reading the Weekly State Bar of New Mexico E-News





Just 10% of the State Bar members who responded say they *always* read the weekly State Bar of New Mexico E-news, while 27% say they *usually* do so. Thirty-eight percent of respondents report that they *sometimes* read the State Bar E-News, though 26% say they *never* read it.

The primary reason given for never reading the State Bar E-News is a lack of time/too busy (19%), while 17% appear to have never heard of it, another 14% say they never receive it, 12% do not feel it is relevant, and 10% say they are simply not interested.




Approximately two-thirds (64%) of State Bar members indicate that they would prefer to receive the *Bar Bulletin* through the mail, while 36% would prefer an email version of the publication. It should be noted that younger members (those under the age of 37) are equally divided as 50% say they prefer to receive the Bar Bulletin by mail and 50% would prefer to receive it by email.

The State Bar of New Mexico website appears to be an important resource as 11% of State Bar members say they visit the site at least once or more a week and 16% say they visit at least once every couple of weeks. Fourteen percent of members report going to the State Bar website about once a month, while just over half (52%) say they visit the site a few times a year.


Younger members/those with less practice experience tend to visit the State Bar's website with greater frequency than do older members.


COMMUNICATIONS (CONTINUED)



As shown above, the majority of members (54%) say they prefer paying their annual State Bar dues by mail while 44% prefer paying online. It should be noted that younger members are much more likely to say they prefer making their payments online (71% among those under the age of 37), whereas older members are much more likely to prefer paying their dues through the mail.


ANNUAL MEETING (CONVENTION)





Three-fifths of State Bar members say they favor an annual meeting of the State Bar, though 40% do not appear to favor the annual meeting. The large majority of members (63%) would prefer the annual State Bar meeting to be held in-state, while just 3% would prefer it be held out-of-state and 35% do not appear to have a preference.

Twenty-nine percent of the members report that they have attended at least one of the State Bar's annual meetings in the past five years, though very few members appear to be dedicated attendees. In total, 14% have attended one meeting, 9% went to two meetings, 3% attended three meetings, and just 2% have attended in each of the past five years.

The primary reasons that members give for not having attended at least one of the State Bar's annual meetings in the past five years are being too busy/work schedule (24%), cost (24%), not having relevant programs (12%), and simply a lack of interest (11%). Inconvenient locations of where the meetings have been held and living out-of-state are each mentioned by 8% of those who do not attend.


When asked what format they prefer for CLE seminars, the vast majority of members (83%) choose live seminars, while 30% prefer online videos (self-study), 20% say they prefer live webcasts, and 18% mention video replay. The preferences total over 100% due to the fact that respondents were allowed to choose two different options, though live seminars are clearly favored over the other formats.

The slight majority of members (53%) say they typically learn about seminars offered by the State Bar's CLE department through the Calendar of Events in the *Bar Bulletin*, while 45% say they learn about the seminars through the CLE-At-A-Glance. Other commonly mentioned ways of learning about the CLE seminars include E-Blasts from the CLE Department (25%), seminar advertisements in the *Bar Bulletin* (19%), and the MCLE office/website (18%).






Just over half (53%) of the State Bar members surveyed say they are currently a member of a voluntary bar association. In total, 16% are members of the Albuquerque Bar Association, while 13% are members of the American Bar Association, 8% are members of the NM Trial Lawyers Association, and 7% are part of the NM Criminal Defense Lawyers. A full list of memberships can be found on page 58 of the report.

In total, 56% of those who are members of a voluntary bar organization say they are actively involved with their organization/association which constitutes 28% of all State Bar members.

Overall, 43% of the members who responded say they have used Casemaker for their legal research. The vast majority (83%) of members who use Casemaker say they are pleased with the research offerings available through the service.

The primary reasons that members give for not using Casemaker is that they are currently using/prefer Westlaw (27%), while 21% are either not aware or recently heard of Casemaker, and 15% say they currently use Lexis-Nexis.




Members were asked if they believe the State Bar should take an active role in supporting various judiciary matters. As shown above, 85% believe the State Bar should be actively supporting independence of the judiciary and 82% believe the State Bar should be actively educating the public on the judiciary.

Approximately three-quarters (76%) of State Bar members believe the State Bar should take an active role in eliminating partisanship from judicial races, while 70% believe the State Bar should be monitoring and responding to criticism of judges, and 69% feel the State Bar should monitor/respond to judicial campaign activity.

Finally, although the majority (54%) of members believe the State Bar should take an active role in support of increasing compensation for judges, 46% disagree.

RECIPROCITY





Overall, the large majority of State Bar of New Mexico members favor reciprocity. As shown above, 77% of survey respondents say they support reciprocal licensing for New Mexico lawyers with other states. Furthermore, 76% say they support the Board of Bar Commissioners advocating a Supreme Court rule change in favor of reciprocity.




When asked to give reasons why they are <u>for</u> reciprocity, 14% of the supporters say it will make it easier to practice outside of New Mexico, while 12% mention that we are a mobile society/companies have multiple locations, and 11% say it will create more job opportunities. Other frequently cited reasons for supporting reciprocity include: the ability to live, work and practice anywhere (9%), not having to take another State Bar exam (8%), and similarly 7% say you should only have to take the State Bar exam once. Another 7% believe that New Mexico should reciprocate with other states that will do the same.


The primary reasons that opponents cite for being against reciprocity are that it will license attorneys who are not familiar with New Mexico law (25%) and that not having reciprocity acts as a gatekeeper in keeping out predatory out-of-state law firms (20%). Fourteen percent of opponents say there are already enough lawyers in New Mexico and 9% say New Mexico attorneys are familiar with the state's unique culture and law.

PRO HAC VICE

Under Rule 24-106, non-admitted attorneys may practice in New Mexico in association with an active member in good standing of the State Bar of New Mexico for a specific case. In other words, non-admitted attorneys can practice in civil cases in state courts by working with local counsel and paying a \$250 fee per case, which is earmarked to benefit civil legal service programs.










As shown above, the vast majority (89%) of members say they support the Pro Hac Vice Rule. However, members are divided in that 53% say they support an increase in the \$250 fee paid by the non-admitted attorneys to benefit civil legal service programs, while 47% are opposed to increasing this fee.

Furthermore, members are divided on limiting pro hac vice appearances by out-of-state attorneys as 49% say they are supportive of such limits and 51% are opposed to limiting appearances by out-of-state attorneys.

CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES









As shown above, 54% of members say they have contributed financially to support legal service programs for those in need in New Mexico. Furthermore, nearly four-fifths (79%) of members say they favor the existing option to provide this financial support in lieu of the professional obligation to provide pro bono assistance. However, just 25% say they support an automatic financial contribution included in their annual Dues/Licensing Form to support legal service programs.

Reasons for Not Having Malpractice Insurance






DISCIPLINARY BOARD




When asked which entity they believe administers the Disciplinary Board, approximately three-quarters (74%) of the survey respondents say it is the Supreme Court of New Mexico, while 14% believe it is the State Bar of New Mexico, 3% mention the Board of Bar Examiners, and 9% say they don't know.









Twelve percent of the members who responded say they have filed a disciplinary complaint. Just over two-thirds (69%) of those who have filed a complaint say it was resolved in a timely manner and 46% say the resolution was appropriate given the alleged violation, though the majority (54%) do not believe the resolution was appropriate.







Over one-third (35%) of the members who responded say they have been the subject of a disciplinary complaint. The vast majority (96%) of those who have been subject to a complaint say it was resolved in a timely manner and say the resolution was appropriate given the alleged violation.



The State Bar members were asked to rate the fairness of hearings and reviews pertaining to the Disciplinary Board. As shown above, one-quarter of the survey respondents believe the Supreme Court's Review of Disciplinary Board recommendations are fair, with just 3% who disagree. One-fifth of the members believe the Disciplinary Hearing Committee are fair, while just 4% disagree. Finally, 19% feel the Disciplinary Board's Review of Hearing Committee decisions are fair, with just 4% who disagree.

The large majority of members do not have an opinion regarding the fairness of the Disciplinary Board's different functions. Approximately three-quarters of the survey respondents were unable to give an evaluation for each of the items tested.




Interest in CLE Courses Relating to Rules of Professional Conduct





Approximately four-fifths (81%) of those who employ a paralegal would encourage their membership in the Paralegal Division, though 19% would not encourage their paralegal to join.


The primary reasons given for encouraging one's paralegal to join the Division are promoting professionalism (27%), networking/collegiality (22%), training/educational opportunities (21%), keeping up with developments (16%), and improving knowledge of job/skills (13%).

Those who would not encourage their paralegal to join the Paralegal Division are most apt to say membership would not be beneficial/has little value (28%), while 11% cite cost and 9% say their paralegal has many years of experience.

Source of Payment for Paralegal's Membership Dues, CLE Fees and Time to Attend CLE Seminars



Among those who have a paralegal, 45% say they pay their (paralegal's) membership dues, while 44% pay their paralegal's CLE fees, and 36% offer paid time off for their paralegal to attend CLE seminars.

Just 14% of State Bar members say they were aware that in some instances paralegal services by Paralegal Division members are billed at higher rates (e.g., paralegals employed by state agencies).

II. SUMMARY OF RESULTS




